Survey Methodologist

- 1998 – Present *Survey of Youth in Residential Placements (SYRP)* – The SYRP is being developed by the Department of Justice to be a re-occurring survey of a national sample of youth who are in residential custody. Dr. Cantor is leading the development of an Audio-Computer Assisted Self Interview questionnaire.
- 1996 – Present *National Survey of American Families (NSAF)* – The NSAF is one of the major national-level surveys being used to monitor the changes in government assistance programs instituted in the late 1990's. The NSAF is designed as a random digit dial telephone survey with a supplemental sample of in-person interviews. Two waves of the interview were conducted in 1997 and 1999. A third round of the survey will be conducted in 2002. Dr. Cantor's primary responsibilities for all three rounds has been to lead the development of the survey procedures and the questionnaire.
- 1998 – Present *Effect of Victims of Crime Act Funding in Meeting the Needs of Victims* – This is a survey to assess the needs of violent crime victims and assess whether those needs are being met. Dr. Cantor is providing guidance on the design of the telephone survey. He will also be analyzing information from the survey.
- 1994 *National Medical Expenditure Survey 3, Family Medical Expenditure Survey* – This is a national survey of the US population collecting information about health, health care and health care expenditures. Dr. Cantor lead the design and testing of questions to identify the type of health care plan of each sampled subject.
